

BACKLOG OF UNPAID BILLS


As of June, 2019

FISCAL YEAR 2020 NEW REVENUE SB 689 / SB 690

Operating Budget

- Require internet marketplaces (e.g. Amazon or EBay) to collect IL Use Tax (6.25%)
- Require remote internet sellers (e.g. Wayfair) to collect IL Retailers' Occupation Tax in effect wherever the product is shipped
- Tax Amnesty Program- \$175M
- Managed Care Organization Assessment \$530M (Medicaid Program)

Capital Budget (Vertical Construction)

- Raise tax on cigarettes by \$1
- New 15% wholesale tax on electronic cigarettes
- New tax on rental parking at 6% (hourly, daily weekly) or 9% (monthly, annual)
- Gaming Expansion
 - Chicago mega casino
 - Video gaming at Chicago airports and IL State Fairgrounds
 - Additional video gaming terminals at current establishments
 - Video gaming at horse racetracks ("Racinos") and new horse track in South Suburbs
 - New casino in Waukegan, South Suburbs, Danvile, Rockford, Southern Illinois (Walker's Bluff)
 - Legalized sports betting

GOVERNOR PRITZKER'S EDUCATION PRIORITIES CREATE A WORLD CLASS EDUCATION SYSTEM FOR ALL

- Pre-K -12 Education
 - Early Childhood Block Grant +\$50 million
 - Evidence-Based Funding +\$375 million
 (\$25 million more than statutory requirement)
 - Mandated Categorical Grants +\$47.3 million

Higher Education

- Public University Funding (increase 5%) +\$52.2 million
- Community College Funding (increase 5%) +\$13.9 million
- MAP +\$50 million
- AIM High Pilot Program (2nd year) +\$10 million

LEGALIZATION OF RECREATIONAL CANNABIS

COMMUNITY COLLEGE CANNABIS VOCATIONAL TRAINING PILOT PROGRAM

- Career in Cannabis Certificate awarded to students wo complete a course of study in cannabis and cannabis business industry related classes and curriculum at a community college.
- Allows participating students (age 18 and older) to work with, study, and grow live cannabis plants. (colleges allowed to have no more than 50 plants at one time)
- Department of Agriculture establishes and administers the program in coordination with ICCB (ICCB program approval required).
- Dept. of Ag. may issue a Program license to up to 8 community colleges.

 (5 Program license awardees must have a student population that is more than 50% low-income in each of the past 4 years)
- Program licensure applications available by February 1, 2020 and due no later than July 1, 2020.
- Certificate program offered beginning in the **2021-2022 academic year** / Sunsets July 1, 2026.
- Report to Governor & General Assembly by IL Cannabis Regulation Oversight Officer (Dec. 31, 2025).



STUDENT MENTAL HEALTH

• HB 2152 (Welch/McGuire) – Mental Health Early Action on Campus

- Designate expert panel to:
 - o Develop & implement policies to address needs to students exhibiting symptoms of mental health conditions,
 - o Increase knowledge of student protection under the law, and
 - o Provide training.
- O Develop & implement peer support program utilizing student peers
- o Form strategic partnerships with local mental health service providers
- O Raise mental health awareness on campuses including implementing a special orientation session, developing special curriculum, and messages via online learning platforms
- o Requires all resident assistant, advisors, and security to participate in a national training course
- o Implement online screening tool

Subject to appropriation and requires the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability in conjunction with ICCB and IBHE to make recommendations to the General Assembly regarding the funding necessary to implement the Act, initially by Dec. 31, 2019

• HB 3404 (Villa/Martinez) – Higher Education Mental Health Information

Required to make information available to students on all mental health and suicide prevention resources available at the community college beginning at the start of the 2020-2021 academic year and for each academic year thereafter.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIPS & GRANTS

• SB 1167 (Ellman/Kifowit) – Community College Vocational Scholarships

- o ISAC to establish and administer an adult vocational community college scholarship program (Beginning with the 2020-2021 academic year)
- O Scholarships to community colleges for people over the age of 30 who have been unemployed and are actively searching for employment and who can identify the specific training certificate, credential, or associate degree that he or she is seeking to obtain.
- Applicants may re-apply for the scholarship if they can demonstrate continual progress toward the desired certificate, credential, or degree.
- o The scholarships shall not exceed \$2,000 per recipient per academic year.

Subject to appropriation (not funded in FY 20 budget)

• SB 1919 (Gillespie Walker) – 21st Century Employment Grant Program

- o ICCB to establish and grant program.
- O Community college & high school must jointly establish a collaborative regional partnership with workforce development organizations, regional economic development organizations, and economic development officials in the district to provide a manufacturing training program.
- o The ICCB must establish an advisory board for the program similar to the current local program boards.

Subject to appropriation (not funded in FY 20 budget)



COLLEGE ACCESS

• HB 2691(E. Hernandez/Aquino) – RISE Act

- o Retention of Illinois Students and Equity Act provides access to State (MAP grants) and institutional financial aid for:
 - o Transgender students who disqualify for federal financial aid for failure to register for selective service
 - o Noncitizen students who are not lawful permanent residents
- o Eliminates 75 credit hour cap on MAP eligibility for students that have not yet attained junior standing
- o 3,500 students could become newly eligible for MAP

HB 2719 (Stuart/Manar) – H.S. Graduation Requirements, FAFSA Completion

- o Beginning with 2020-2021 school year high school students must complete FAFSA as a condition of graduation
- Waiver provisions for parent, guardian or student (if 18 or emancipated) to opt out of filing for any reason
- O Schools can waive requirements after making a good faith effort to support student in completing FAFSA or an opt out waiver.



RESOLUTIONS

• HR 371 (Crespo) – Perkins & WOIA State Plans

- Encourages ISBE, ICCB, and the IWIB to work collaboratively with each other and with school districts, community colleges, business and industry, and other organizations to ensure alignment among the Perkins and WIOA plans and priority occupational areas.
- O Directs the ISBE, ICCB, and IWIB to report to the General Assembly and the P-20 Council on how the State's draft versions of the Perkins and WIOA plans address the foregoing recommendations.

• SJR 22 (Schimpf/Bryant) – IAI Course Efficiency Study

o IBHE and ICCB to jointly identify any shortcomings with IAI and General Education Core Curriculum course transfer between institutions with full credit towards a baccalaureate degree

• SJR 41 (McGuire/Ammons) – Developmental Education Joint Advisory Council

- o IBHE and ICCB to establish a joint advisory council.
- On or before April 1, 2020, study and report to the General Assembly, an inventory and analysis of all instructional models and developmental course sequences employed by Illinois' public colleges and universities for students placed into developmental education & developmental education placement practices and policies (including cut off scores).
- On or before July 1, 2020, the advisory council must deliver to ICCB, IBHE, and the General Assembly, a detailed plan for scaling developmental education reforms, such that institutions improve developmental education placement measures
- O Within a timeframe to be set by the advisory council, all students who are placed in developmental education are enrolled in a developmental education model that is proven to maximize their likelihood of completing a college-level course within their first two academic semesters
