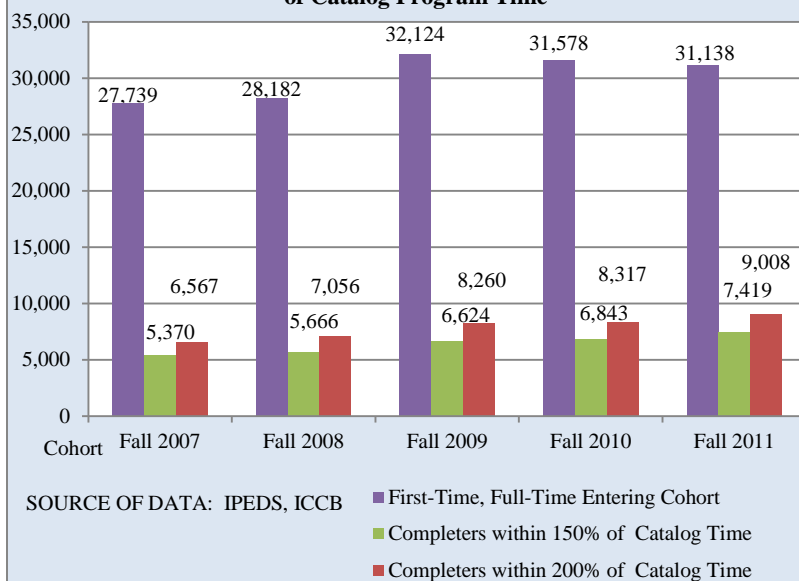


# Illinois Community College Board Frequently Asked Questions

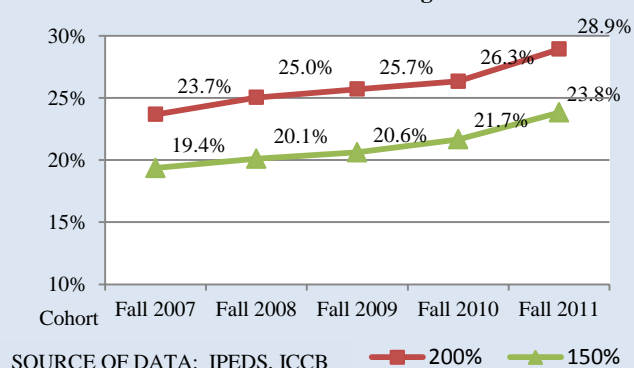
## WHAT IS THE GRADUATION RATE FOR ILLINOIS COMMUNITY COLLEGES?

Graduation rates provide one useful measure to help inform the public and policymakers about how colleges are performing in their efforts to graduate individuals who begin their studies pursuing a traditional enrollment pattern. The primary postsecondary graduation rate collected through the U.S. Department of Education's Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) provides the percentage of first-time, full time students who graduate within 150% of catalog time (e.g. 3 years for an associate degree which could be completed in 2 years of uninterrupted full-time study – fall and spring semesters). IPEDS also collects a 200% of catalog time graduation rate (e.g., 4 years for an associate degree) to provide some additional time for graduates to emerge from the entering cohort. Figure 1 contains the number of first-time, full-time entrants and the graduates who emerge from that group at 150% and 200% of catalog time. Community college students often switch to part-time attendance or enroll on an intermittent basis.

The trend data in Figure 2 show that overall statewide **graduation rates** among first-time, full-time Illinois community college students have continued to **increase** for both the 150% and 200% calculations.

Over the past five years the **graduation rate** of Illinois community college students who completed within **150% of catalog time** increased from 19.4 percent in fiscal year 2010 (Fall 2007 cohort) to **23.8 percent in fiscal year 2014** (Fall 2011 cohort). That means for fiscal year 2014, more than one in five (N = 7,419/31,138) who began their studies as first-time, full-time students at Illinois community colleges in Fall 2011 graduated by Summer 2015. In fiscal year 2014 the number of graduates saw an increase to reach 7,419 from 6,843 in fiscal year 2013. During this same time period, the graduation rate increased 2.2 percent from 21.7 percent.

Focusing on the Fall 2011 cohort shows that when the length of time to graduate is increased to **200% of catalog time**, the statewide Illinois graduation rate increased 5.1 percent as 1,589 additional students earned degrees or certificates. For the Fall 2011 entering cohort, 23.8 percent completed by Summer 2014 (150% of program time), while **28.9 percent completed by Summer 2015** (200% of program time).

The most recent national data available from the National Center for Education Statistics shows that twenty percent of students at public 2-year institutions graduate with a certificate or associate degree within 150% of catalog time (<http://nces.ed.gov/pubs2015/2015144.pdf>, See Indicator 41, Figure 4).
